Core Aeration

Every Fall, we talk about lawn aeration and it's that time of year again. Many of our clients have been aerating for several years now and have found that their turf grass is definitely thicker and more lush, not to mention our customers' aerated lawns grow significantly less weeds than those who only fertilize. Why is that? Well, let me tell you. When a lawn is aerated and all of those goose poo looking things are left all over your yard, the hole that is left behind stimulates the already developing fall root growth. The hole forces the roots to grow deeper which makes them less susceptible to dryness and produces thicker grass. Thicker grass means not only a nicer lawn, but less weeds!



If a lawn is already thin, aeration is still a good idea. However, overseeding will greatly increase the turf's quality for the following spring. This works by a machine that pushes seed directly into the ground without damaging what already exists.



The whole process of regular core aeration is one of the very best services that you can order for your lawn. Annual aeration lets your lawn take full advantage of the nutrient value in the soil.

Area Landscaper Obtains Certification

The purposes of the Ohio Certified Nursery Technician—Landscape program are to improve the skills and knowledge of the landscape installer; to have this improvement and professional qualifications recognized in the eyes of the public as well as within the landscape and nursery industry; and to provide the public, architects, and contractors with dependable landscape construction techniques and horticultural expertise.

A training manual for the OCNT program was authored by various faculty members of The Ohio State University Department of Horticulture, and edited by a nine-member committee comprised of garden center owners, nursery stock growers, and landscape

contractors from around the state.

To receive recognition as an Ohio Certified Nursery Technician—Landscape, a person must successfully pass a 170-question examination based on information contained in the training manual and practical work experience. In order to retain certification status, an OCNT must continuously expand their knowledge of the green goods industry by attending seminars and courses.

The Ohio Certified Nursery Technician program is not in any way connected with any agency of the government, but is solely and exclusively a voluntary education program sponsored by the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association.
